

And, so, 14 years after the parasailing accident—a result of a dangerous life—a writer was reborn. But, you ask, how did Barry Parham, the web designer formerly known as a writer, begin to believe in himself as a writer again?

"That event, the memory of that pain just never leaves me," Parham jokes, "well not for long, anyway." It was during one such remembering of the unfortunate turn of events of 14 years ago that Barry decided to write it all down, "for therapeutic reasons," he says with a sly grin, and an essay entitled "Why I Hate Straws" was transformed from a memory to a laugh-out-loud story about a regular guy that other people could read and laugh along with too.



While continuing his work building websites, Parham had a side gig going for years. He had been moonlighting as a blogger, putting his college education to good use by writing about things—about the little things, the big things and the extraordinarily weird things of everyday life. In 2009 he branched out and began writing a weekly column for AssociatedContent.com and developed a serious group of laughing followers, believers in the life-through-cracked-glasses flavor of Barry's written observations.

One day, Barry realized that he had to take another risk. Remember, sometimes, the life of a writer is dangerous. This time, it would not be parasailing. This time he was going to collect his series of stories, put them between covers and get his first book published. And that, children, is how the book, <u>Why I Hate Straws: An offbeat</u> worldview of an offbeat world was published.
